Course Description: This 3 credit course focuses on the production aspects of large-acreage

agronomic crops. Principles including breeding and seed selection, row spacing, planting, fertility management, tillage and implements, irrigation, and biotic stressors and their management will be covered. An in depth

overview of the major agronomic crops will also be discussed.

<u>Course Prerequisites:</u> Plant Physiology and Plant Science - helpful but not required.

Course Objectives: By the end of this course, students will be able to:

1) Explain how basic agronomic principles are used to develop a

production system for the major agronomic crops.

2) Explain how mechanization and tillage implements are used in in the

production of field crops.

3) Explain how irrigation, soil fertility and pests are managed in a typical

agronomic production system.

4) Identify and be able to discuss the growth cycles of the major

agronomic field crops.
