

Description An introduction to biological invasions including plants, animals, and microbes. Biology and ecology of invasive species and exploration of invaded ecosystems. Role of humans in invasions, impacts of invasions on communities and ecosystems, management of invaded natural areas. Offered every fall term.

Biological invasions can have significant ecological effects on communities and ecosystems. Monitoring, prevention, management, and impacts of invasions are a significant drain on the global economy. In this course, we provide a broad overview of non-native invaders with emphasis on invasive species in Florida. We will cover the stages of the invasion process, mechanisms underlying invasions, characteristics of communities vulnerable to invasions, impacts of invasions, and management approaches.

Assignments, Exams, and Participation

Essays	Three one-page essays will be due throughout the semester. Essays will be graded on organization, grammar, content, and clarity. The essay topics include: 1) defining biodiversity, its importance, and how it varies by regional scale, 2) the benefits and risks of non-native species, and 3) the benefits and challenges of biocontrol.	
Presentations	In groups of 2-4, students will select an invasive species and create and deliver a presentation that describes the species, origin and invasive range, invasion process, and management options. The presentation should also include a short quiz, and an individual worksheet should be completed demonstrating knowledge of the invasion process for the species.	
Current Even	t Once during the semester students will share with the class a current event related to invasive species. The objective of this assignment is to encourage exploration of current events in the news and on social media and to recognize the frequency that invasive species, and the problems they cause, are highlighted by news media. Current events will be graded as complete or incomplete.	
Exams	Two exams will be administered during the course, one at the mid-point and one at the end of the semester. Exams will cover concepts presented during lecture and discussions, but <u>not</u> information from student presentations on individual species. Some exam questions will be drawn from readings and videos, in addition to lecture content.	
Participation	Student participation in class is worth 40 points (10.5% of course grade). 10 points will be based on participation in group presentation quizzes. The remainder of the participation points will be based on asking and responding to questions and comments during discussions.

Privacy	Our class sessions may be audio visually recorded for students in the class to refer back and for enrolled students who are unable to attend live. Students who participate with their camera engaged or utilize a profile image are agreeing to have their video or image recorded. In Class Recording
